Broad topics & an inclusive learning environment

we've done some really interesting things... there's a range of professions aren't there, and a range of knowledge bases (E05)

That group it does stop everyone not to have a badge saying we are social workers and we are doctors and we are disabled people, we are same in that group that is [a] beautiful thing itself (E04)



Thirst for capturing & coproducing knowledge

I always come away finding that I've taken something away of something interesting or something else I could read about (E05)



Learning through building relationships

Well, as a result of these COPs, I think that certainly relationships between academia, frontline delivery and people, experts by experience, I think that there is a better relationship there, which is vital... it gives another perspective (P04)

Sharing learning and knowledge transfer within and beyond the COP in adult social care (defining territory)

Promoting shared learning within the constraints of the prevailing culture

 Overall, it needs to be more of a culture change within social care organisations that practitioners feel they have permission and are encouraged to do this [attend COPs]. (P03)

A shared 'language' of research to promote learning

• I think sometimes that's about language and about not understanding each other. I don't think we always understand research speak and I think researchers don't always understand social care language. (P01)

Identifying their potential for influencing new social care practice (inventing new practice)

Networking, validating research ideas and developing knowledge-exchange collaborations

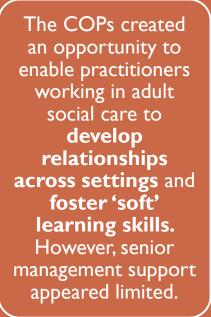
Embedding learning into practice and influencing policy

- I met... a good and collaborative community, which is rare to find, because these collaborations between practitioners, members of the public and academia are not easy to build. (R01)
- It was a validation and the endorsement. (P07)

• From my point of view, because the outcome of the COPs meant that I was able to share information and it is, you know, bringing things to people's forefront of their mind. That in time you like to think actually, you know, does start to inform policy (P06)

Key learning points

The COPs exhibited a strong inclusive community element, allowing a broad range of topics to help generate learning.







COP members described how information shared had the potential to influence practice individually or at a service level, with the potential [but no actual evidence!] to shape policy.
