# Galathea's copyright

## Rousseau and the 'battle of the booksellers'

In the twenty-first century, the idea that a literary work contains the 'soul' of its creator is seen by literary critics as an outdated cliché associated with biographical criticism and is evoked in legal discourse as a figure for the personalist conception of authorial rights. The dramatization of this metaphor in Rousseau's *Pygmalion*, a brief work written for the stage in 1762 has been exclusively read from an aesthetic point of view; in making the sculptor himself (rather than Venus) animate the statue of Galathea by offering her a piece of his soul, Rousseau is presenting his protagonist as a genius, echoing contemporary aesthetic debates on the role of the artist and his relation to his work. In this paper, I shall argue that Rousseau's *Pygmalion* can also be read alongside the contemporary legal debate on the relation between author and work that leads to the 1777 decrees on the regulation of the book trade; I shall attempt to place Rousseau's dramatization of the metaphor of the soul within the context of its uses in eighteenth-century aesthetic and legal texts as well as within the context of Rousseau's own publishing practices and his relations with his publishers.
